

House Bill 4095 Testimony in Opposition - 4/24/2019 House Ways and Means Committee

Important Facts and information to consider

- ✓ This bill is written specifically for House of Providence which is a corporation that is licensed as a Child Care Institution, known as a CCI
- ✓ CCI's are not foster homes. CCI's are not group homes
- ✓ There is currently a **surplus of 3,312 CCI beds** throughout this State
- ✓ Only 950 CCI beds are used in any given year.
- ✓ Children who are eligible for placement in foster care homes or adoption are not supposed to be placed into a CCI
- ✓ Placement into a CCI requires a finding that the needs of the child cannot be met in a foster home and is supposed to be temporary
- ✓ MDHHS reports a shortage of adoptive and foster parents – not CCI's
- ✓ Increasing number of residents CCI's will not alleviate the problem with the current shortage of adoptive and foster parents

The questions that need to be asked of MDHHS

1. Why does MDHHS support increasing the residents in a CCI when there is already an overwhelming excess of CCI beds currently available?
2. How will enacting legislation that overrides local zoning by increasing residents allowed in institutional facilities in single family zoning districts create more foster family home beds?
3. **What specifically will this legislation help?**
4. Is MDHHS placing children into CCI's because of a shortage of foster homes? If so, that issue must be identified and addressed because children are not supposed to be placed into a CCI if they are eligible for adoption or placement into a foster home
5. Are there any children needing placement into a CCI in Oakland County who have been unable to be placed due to a shortage of CCI beds in Oakland County?
6. How many of the 945 children in CCI's are currently eligible for adoption and how would this legislation help them?
7. How many of the 945 children in CCI's are currently eligible for placement into a foster care home and how would this legislation help them?
8. How would this legislation help the 300 kids needing adoption?
9. How would adding capacity to a CCI, when there is already a surplus of beds, address the problem of a lack of adoptive parents?
10. Why does MDHHS continue to license CCI's and incur the expense of oversight and inspections when there is such an excess of beds? Would this money be better spent on recruitment and retention of adoptive and foster parents?

Some History

The House of Providence plans to form of an institutional campus consisting of multiple facilities on parcels they created by splitting up a former shooting range. This property is in a rural single-family agricultural zoning District on one of the few remaining agricultural zoned properties in in the Township. Further, this area is widely recognized for its unique character and rich history and its preservation as an equestrian and agricultural center of Oxford is stated numerous times in the Master Plan and Zoning Ordinance. Great efforts have been made to preserve this area and restrict use to equestrian and agricultural use.

Oxford Township already has an outstanding CCI facility on a sprawling campus complete with lakes, trails and even its own school? They are licensed for 92 beds in numerous facilities throughout the property and they are located very near the town center and is nowhere near capacity. They located this campus in the proper zoning district and obtained the necessary approvals.

- These petitioners want you to enact legislation that will allow them to disregard the zoning regulations and master planning that was carefully put in place long before their purchase of this property.
- No other group or child caring organization is supporting this legislation
- This is contrary to the goals of zoning and community planning and does not take the infrastructure of the area into consideration
- A Child Care Institution with 10 residents is not equivalent to a single-family residential use
- If you were to equate 10-residents plus staff as a single-family equivalent then this formula should be allowed in every residential District, regardless of the parcel size.
- The current zoning at their Oxford Township property allows them to operate their Institution with 6 residents

HOUSE OF PROVIDENCE WAS FULLY AWARE OF THE ZONING RESTRICTIONS BEFORE THEY PURCHASED THE OXFORD PROPERTY AND NOW THEY ARE ASKING FOR YOU TO STOMP OVER THE TOWNSHIP'S REGULATIONS SO THEY CAN GET WHAT THEY WANT.

To sum it up:

- You are being told it is because there is a great need – but that isn't true – the children do not need this
- You are being told it is somehow in the children's interest to increase the number of children in the facility -- but you know that is wrong
- The Dunn's have stated that Oxford Township is in full support of this bill – that is not true

Please see this issue for what it is:

A NO vote is a vote to protect the children in the institution from having too many residents

A NO vote is a vote to protect the community by preserving the local government's ability to ensure resident density of residential facilities matches the character, infrastructure capabilities and use patterns of districts they are located in.

POINTS TO CONSIDER – Please vote NO

**There is currently a surplus of 3,312 CCI beds
945 CCI beds are utilized – 4,257 beds are licensed**

-- MDHHS is responsible for the care and supervision of apx. 13,500 children --

6,480 (nearly half) are currently in their own home or placed with relatives

4,590 are placed in foster homes because no relatives are available

945 children are placed into a CCI (Child Caring Institution) which is a court mandated placement into an institutional setting including juvenile Detention Centers and homes for children with disabilities and mental health treatment facilities

We have 3,312 available beds in existing licensed CCI's – these facilities are currently approved by MDHHS who has determined that they provide the necessary services - there is no need to change legislation to fix a problem that does not exist

Please consider the real reason for this legislation and this bills ramifications

There is no actual need for such a drastic measure. This bill drastically changes the spirit and intent of the Michigan Zoning Enabling Act and allows large scale institutional facilities to be located in single-family residential neighborhoods without the ability to regulate infrastructure adequacy, conformance with the master plan and unique preservation goals of a district Its impact is far reaching and has consequences which must be considered

- **This bill is written for one special interest group** and enables institutions like themselves to buy property in a single family residential or agricultural districts, split the property up, and create unlimited numbers of housing units on the same campus
- **This bill defies case law** (*Larkin v. State*, 883 F. Supp. 172 (E.D. Mich. 1995)). The court has determined that you cannot regulate residential household occupancy to parcel size and you cannot regulate the number of occupants residing as a family unit/functional family in a residence and that distance separation between facilities is not enforceable - rendering the amendment to the bill unenforceable
- **Current law allowing 6 or fewer residents** has been thoroughly evaluated and universally accepted nationwide, increasing the number 10 occupants improperly classifies the increased density as equivalent to a residential use with no foundational evidence supporting the rational
- **Increasing residents in these facilities on parcels of 20 acres or larger is arbitrary and prejudicial** to the property owners in that zoning district
- **CCI's and residential facilities of 6 or fewer occupants are already allowed**
- **Federal and State standards for foster care report that increasing occupants in these setting to more than 6 is detrimental.**
- **Communities can already increase the number of residents and do not need this legislation to do this**
- **There is no reason to enact legislation for a problem that does not exist**
- **This bill fails to specify net or gross acreage, unbuildable land is included and shouldn't be**
- **This bill fails to address the infrastructure and suitability of the site**

Use should correlate to the characteristics of the surrounding land use and the infrastructure to support it – not parcel size. If this use is acceptable on a 20 acre parcel it should be acceptable in every other size parcel and the local municipality is best equipped to make such a decision

consultant shall provide consultation on all health related matters required under this Agreement. The medical consultant shall report to the Health Unit Manager.

4.18 Medical, Dental, and Mental Health Services, Policy (Commitment 18).

- (a) DHHS shall ensure that every child receives all needed emergency medical, dental, and mental health care.
- (b) DHHS shall ensure that every child receives all needed follow-up medical, dental, and mental health care as identified.

4.19 Corporal Punishment & Seclusion/Isolation, Prohibition and Policy (Commitment 19). DHHS shall prohibit the use of Positive Peer Culture, peer-on-peer restraint, and any other forms of corporal punishment in all foster care placements and shall maintain a policy regarding seclusion/isolation.

4.20 Contract Agency Requirements (Commitment 20).

- (a) DHHS's contracts with private CPAs and Child Caring Institutions ("CCI"s shall be performance-based and shall include all of the following requirements: (1) compliance with performance goals as set forth in this Agreement; (2) compliance with all aspects of all DHHS policies and procedures that apply to the provider; (3) any reports of suspected abuse or neglect of any Plaintiff while receiving such contracted placements or services shall be reported to DHHS for investigation; (4) all placement providers for foster children in DHHS foster care custody are prohibited from using or authorizing the use of corporal punishment for children under the care and supervision of DHHS or the private CPA or CCI; (5) any reports of suspected corporal punishment while in that provider's care shall be reported to DHHS and investigated by DHHS, the CPA, or the CCI, as necessary; and (6) all CCIs or private CPAs that provide placements and child welfare services to Plaintiffs report to DHHS accurate data on at least a six-month basis in relation to the requirements of this Agreement. DHHS shall independently monitor and enforce these contracts. Further, DHHS shall maintain a set of enforcement measures to be imposed in the event that a contract agency fails to comply with material terms or requirements of the performance-based contract.
- (b) DHHS shall give due consideration to any and all substantial incidents of abuse, neglect, and/or corporal punishment occurring in the placements licensed and supervised by a CPA or CCI at the time of processing its application for licensure renewal. The failure of a CPA or CCI to report suspected abuse or neglect of a child to DHHS shall result in an immediate investigation to determine the appropriate corrective action up to and including termination or modification of relevant portions of a contract, or placement of the provider on provisional licensing status. A repeated failure within one year shall result in a review of the contract agency's violations by a designated Administrative

home that is the best available match for that child, irrespective of whether that foster home is a DHHS- or private CPA-operated foster home. This Commitment can become eligible to move to structures and policies.

- 6.7 Placement Standard (Commitment 43).** Children in the foster care custody of DHHS shall be placed only in a licensed foster home, a licensed facility, pursuant to an order of the court, or an unlicensed relative with a waiver. This Commitment is never eligible for rolling exit.
- 6.8 Placement in Jail, Correctional, or Detention Facility (Commitment 44).** No child in DHHS foster care custody shall be placed by DHHS or with knowledge of DHHS, in a jail, correctional, or detention facility unless such child is being placed pursuant to a delinquency charge. DHHS shall notify the State Court Administrative Office and the Michigan State Police of this prohibition, and provide written instructions to immediately notify the local DHHS office of any child in DHHS foster care custody who has been placed in a jail, correctional, or detention facility. If it comes to the attention of DHHS that a child in DHHS foster care custody has been placed in a jail, correctional, or detention facility, and such placement is not pursuant to a delinquency charge, DHHS shall ensure the child is moved to a DHHS foster care placement as soon as practicable, and in all events within five days, unless the court orders otherwise over DHHS's objection. If a child in DHHS foster care custody is placed in a jail, correctional, or detention facility pursuant to a delinquency charge, and the disposition of such a charge is for the child to return to a foster care placement, then DHHS shall return the child to a DHHS placement as soon as practicable but in no event longer than five days from disposition, unless the court orders otherwise over DHHS objection. This Commitment is never eligible for rolling exit.
- 6.9 Placement Outside 75-Mile Radius (Commitment 45).**
- (a) DHHS shall place all children within a 75-mile radius of the home from which the child entered custody unless:
- (1) the child's needs are so exceptional that they cannot be met by a family or facility within a 75-mile radius;
 - (2) the child needs re-placement and the child's permanency goal is reunification with his or her parents who at that time reside out of the 75-mile radius;
 - (3) the child is to be placed with a relative or sibling out of the 75-mile radius; or
 - (4) the child is to be placed in an appropriate pre-adoptive or adoptive home that is out of the 75-mile radius.

6.15 Residential Care Placements (Commitment 51).

- (a) **No child shall be placed into a CCI unless:**
- (1) there are specific findings, documented in the child's case file, that:
 - (i) the child's needs cannot be met in any other type of placement;
 - (ii) the child's needs can be met in the specific facility requested; and
 - (iii) the facility is the least restrictive placement to meet the child's needs; and
 - (2) A description of the service available in the facility to address the individual child's needs must also be documented in the case file.
- (b) The initial placement of a child into a CCI must be approved by the County Director or, in a Designated County, a county-level child welfare Administrator. The need for a CCI shall be reassessed every 90 days. No children shall be placed in a residential placement for more than six months without the express authorization, documented in the child's case file, of the County Director or, in a Designated County, a county-level child welfare Administrator. No child shall be placed in a residential placement for more than 12 months without the express authorization, documented in the child's case file, of the director of Child Welfare Field Operations or the director's manager designee.
- (c) The Designated Performance Standard for this Commitment is 97%, and the Floor Performance Standard is 95%. This Commitment is never eligible for rolling exit.

6.16 Relative Foster Parents (Commitment 52).

- (a) When placing a child with a relative who has not been previously licensed as a foster parent, DHHS shall:
- (1) prior to placement, visit the relative's home to determine that it is safe;
 - (2) within 72 hours following placement, check law enforcement and central registry records for all adults residing in the home; and
 - (3) within 30 days, complete a home study determining whether the relative should, upon completion of training and submission of any other required documents, be licensed as a foster parent.
- (b) The Designated Performance Standard for this Commitment is 95%, and the Floor Performance Standard is 90%. DHHS's compliance with this Commitment will be measured through a QAP until MiSACWIS can produce data to evaluate this measure. This Commitment is never eligible for rolling exit.

Dear Ms. Doane and Ms. Wiggins:

Our firm represents the Charter Township of Oxford. We have recently received a copy of an application submitted by House of Providence for a "child caring institution" located in Oxford Township. We note on the attached application form that in the column labeled "capacity" the number "10" has been inserted. Currently, the Zoning Enabling Act ("ZEA") still defines a "state licensed residential facility" (which is permitted by the ZEA in a residential zone) as one providing residential services to 6 or fewer individuals (See MCLA 125.3102(t)). We are aware that proposed legislation is being considered in the state legislature that would increase the number of individuals in the ZEA definition of "state licensed residential facility" to 10, but that legislation has not yet been passed by the legislature. Unless and until the law changes, we want to be sure that all concerned are aware that only 6 individuals can be served in the proposed House of Providence residential facility in Oxford Township that is the subject of the attached application.

Please let us know how DHHS will be verifying that only 6 individuals will be served in the proposed facility in Oxford Township while the current statutory definition under the ZEA cited above remains in effect.
