# Testimony Supporting House Bill 4454 of 2023 Michigan House of Representatives Committee on Economic Development and Small Business offered on behalf of the Downtown Detroit Business Improvement Zone and Downtown Detroit Partnership

Rep. Jason Hoskins, Chairman, and Honorable Committee Members:

Thank you for your consideration of House Bill 4454. On behalf of the Downtown Detroit Business Improvement Zone and Downtown Detroit Partnership, we support House Bill 4454. Thank you to Representative Tyrone Carter for your leadership as the sponsor of the bill. This amendment to Chapter 2 of the Principal Shopping District Act, the BIZ Act, is needed and needed quickly. The Act was amended in 2020 to give communities the <u>option</u> to include residentially assessed property, such as condos, in a BIZ. The bill before you removes the ability to assess residential property, restoring this tool for use in business districts.

A Business Improvement Zone is a tool to facilitate private investment by the business community. It is <u>not a tax</u>, it is <u>not tax increment financing</u>, it is <u>not a tax abatement</u>, and it in no way diverts taxes from local government or negatively impacts local finances. HB 4454 REMOVES the option to assess residential property and all references added related to informing residential property owners. This is a tool to facilitate private investment by commercial property owners who pay commercial property taxes.

Unlike similar tools in Chapter 1, a BIZ is initiated by property owners, not the government. Detroit leaders, led by Roger Penske, had been voluntarily keeping sidewalks clean, maintaining the landscape in street medians, installing holiday lighting, and funding similar services in Downtown Detroit's public spaces through Clean Downtown, a voluntary BIZ started when Michigan hosted the Superbowl in Detroit in 2006.

Our community worked with your predecessors and designed the BIZ tool to facilitate a sustained source of private funding to help keep downtowns like Detroit clean. These property owners who were paying to fund their shared commitment to cleaning Downtown and similar priorities needed a mechanism to bill, collect, and administer contributions from all property owners who benefitted from the services. They also wanted a longer-term commitment so they could provide full-time, permanent jobs and invest in equipment. The intent of the BIZ Act was and continues to be to enable property owners to come together to fund their priorities in their neighborhood, efficiently, effectively, and transparently. That statute is Chapter 2 of the Principal Shopping District Act which enables Business Improvement Zones.





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Under the original BIZ Act, only commercial properties assessed under the general property tax act were subject to a BIZ assessment. After close to three years of collaborating on enabling legislation to give communities the option to include residential property, the Act was amended in spring 2020, just a few weeks into the pandemic shutdown. To our surprise, many additional changes were inserted that left the BIZ Act practically unusable. Since then, no new Business Improvement Zones have been formed in Michigan.

With our colleagues at Ann Arbor Spark, we have convened all organizations with existing Business Improvement Zones and all that, to our knowledge, are actively pursuing new ones. We all agree that this change is needed and that the proposed language works for our neighborhoods.

The Downtown BIZ provides close to 150,000 labor hours of services keeping downtown clean, safe, and welcoming every year. That is more than 100 local jobs. The collective contribution by Downtown property owners through the BIZ is nearing \$45 million.

In 2014, 87% of property owners voted to approve the Downtown Detroit BiZ for a 10-year period. All the owners we have talked with recently support renewal. Our renewal vote is on hold until the BiZ Act is restored. So are petitions to create new BiZs being initiated by property owners in at least three other Michigan neighborhoods: Rivertown, Corktown, and Ann Arbor. Several more are being contemplated. Please approve this bill, approve it quickly, and authorize immediate effect, paving the way for the contributions of millions of dollars of private funding in Michigan's business districts by Michigan businesses.

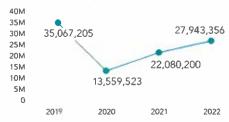

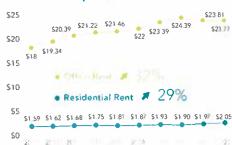

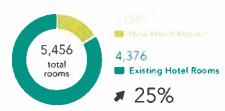

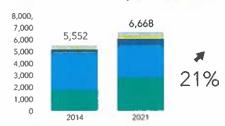
