What is PACE?

Program of All-inclusive Care for the Elderly

- An integrated system of care for the frail elderly that is both the provider AND the managed care health plan:
 - Community-based
 - Comprehensive
 - > Coordinated
 - Capitated- Full Risk



The PACE Model Who Does It Serve?

- 55 years of age or older
- Living in a PACE service area
- Certified as needing nursing home level of care
- Able to live safely in the community with the services of the PACE program at the time of enrollment

*Medicaid Eligibility: \$2250 monthly income limit & \$2000 in total assets. (Although Medicaid is not required, 99% of PACE participants receive Medicaid)



The PACE Model:





- PACE is paid "Per Member Per Month" (PMPM):
 - Medicaid (fixed monthly rate)

2018 Mean PMPM Rate: \$3,444


*Average Medicaid Nursing Home rate \$5,900 month

Medicare (risk-adjusted monthly rate)

2018 Mean PMPM Rate: \$2,420

PACE Programs are Medicare Part-D providers


*PACE must comply with federal, state, & Part D regulations.

Public Act 447 of 2018 Avoid Duplication of PACE Services in Michigan

In 2018, the MI legislature overwhelmingly approved legislation that supports the continuation of Michigan's current application process and approach to service area designation.

Public Act 447 of 2018:

- Continues to provide the frail elderly with a choice of programs (i.e., a choice between a nursing homes, the PACE Program, or the MI Choice Medicaid waiver, which provides home and community-based services for the elderly and disabled);
- Avoids unnecessary duplication of services across PACE organizations, thus helping control program costs and the quality of services;
- Eliminates the potential to impair the financial and service viability of an existing PACE program;
- ► Eliminates the potential for PACE organizations to divert limited resources from providing care services to program participants to the marketing and other efforts to enroll participants if more than one PACE program operates in a service area; and
- Promotes collaboration among PACE organizations. PACE organizations across the state work collaboratively to share information about best practices and leverage resources to help ensure the best outcomes for frail elder adults.
