Good afternoon Chairman Howell and Representatives of the Natural Resources and Outdoor Recreation Committee. Thank you for inviting me and my students from Waldon Middle School in Lake Orion to give testimony today on HB4589 to make the Eastern wild turkey Michigan's state game bird. Our participation here today is an incredible opportunity to bring these students' textbook to life and learn about how state government works. This is an experience that we will never forget, and I thank you.

Why do states have symbols? Some of Michigan's symbols represent things that are unique to the state, such as the Petoskey stone or Kalkaska sand. Other symbols represent the culture of the state such as the white pine that symbolizes Michigan's logging history. Michigan currently has a state game animal, the white-tailed deer, to represent Michigan's rich tradition of hunting and fishing. Hunting has been, and is currently, a big part of our state's culture and economy. It's time to add a game bird to that list of state symbols.

Why name a state game bird? Naming a state game bird would complement the white-tailed deer and celebrate the passion that many of our state's residents have for hunting and conservation. Michigan would join eight other states that currently recognize a game bird as one of their state symbols. The state game bird chosen should be the best representative of all the birds that can be legally pursued in Michigan. After careful consideration, we would like to nominate the Eastern wild turkey as Michigan's state game bird.

Why should the Eastern wild turkey be named the state game bird? There are many reasons. One of the most significant is the turkey's history as one of the biggest conservation success stories in Michigan, and the nation. Wild turkeys were extirpated from the state by 1900, but through the efforts of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and the National Wild Turkey Federation, the wild turkey has made a remarkable comeback to the point that it is currently found in 76 of 83 counties in the state, with numbers topping 200,000 statewide. Al Stewart, the DNR's upland game bird specialist says that, "the restoration of the wild turkey is sort of the pinnacle of all that's been done for wildlife in this country." Such a success story would be recognized by making the wild turkey our state game bird.

The wild turkey also contributes to conservation and the state's economy through hunters' dollars. According to the DNR, over 100,000 hunters head to the woods each spring to hunt turkeys in Michigan. Since this is the only game that can be hunted in the spring, hunters must purchase their base license for \$11 and their turkey license for another \$15. That's \$2.6 million in license sales that goes to the state to manage all our wildlife, not just turkeys. That amount doesn't even factor in the additional Pittman-Robertson dollars that are multiplied and awarded to the state as a result of those turkey license sales. Add in the economic impact to the state from turkey hunters buying ammo and gear, staying in hotels and eating meals at restaurants during the six-week season and you begin to see why turkey hunting and the wild turkey is so important to the state of Michigan as a game bird. Because the wild turkey is responsible for bringing millions of dollars to our state's economy and conservation efforts, it should be named the state game bird.

As a game bird, the turkey is unmatched in Michigan. Over 30,000 of these native birds are harvested each year, but every turkey hunter will tell you that harvesting your bird is no guarantee. They are uniquely adapted to their environment with excellent sight and hearing, able to elude hunters with their fast running and flying. While turkey hunting takes skill, if one is lucky enough to harvest the largest game bird in North America, you can look forward to over eight pounds of free ranging, low cholesterol, hormone and chemical free meat. Try getting that from a woodcock, ruffed grouse or pheasant! The skill needed to harvest one, and the unique characteristics of this native bird are more reasons why the wild turkey would be the best representative for Michigan's state game bird.

Michigan has other game birds, but none of them can compare to the Eastern wild turkey as the best candidate to become the state game bird. The turkey is larger than any other game bird, and no other bird meets the criteria of being native to the state, a year-round resident, and found throughout the state. The wild turkey represents the epitome of upland bird and waterfowl hunting in Michigan.

For all of these reasons, I urge the committee to vote to pass HB4589 on to the next committee, with the hopes of seeing the Eastern wild turkey named Michigan's state game bird.

### Eastern Wild Turkey Should be the State Game Bird.



In today's day and age, all states have certified state birds, but most states do not have a game bird as one of its symbols. Therefore, I believe Michigan should adopt a game bird as one of its state symbols. Among the fifty states in the United States, eight of them have a game bird. 
