






Who are Michigan's Municipal Electric Utilities?

- 40 municipally owned electric utilities represented by the Michigan Municipal Electric Association (MMEA)
- Approx. 2GW or 10% of load
- Diverse in customer size:
 - Daggett < 200
 - Lansing Board of Water & Light ≈ 100,000
- Total over 300,000 customers
- Non-profit, community owned & operated
- Not regulated by MPSC








Michigan Public Power Agency


