





State of Housing in Michigan

- We see today dramatic shortages of housing in our state.
 - Today our state is short 190,000 units of housing needed to meet the demands of our current population.
 - 48% of Michigan renters and 18% of Michigan homeowners pay too much for housing (over 30% of their income).
 - The average number of building permits for new construction issued between 2016 and 2020 is less than half of what it was between 1986 and 2006.
 - 8,997 Michiganders are experiencing homelessness.
 - 1,335 experiencing unsheltered homelessness.

State of Housing in Michigan

- The impact of the housing shortage is real and measurable:
 - From 2013-2021, the average sale price for a home in Michigan grew by <u>84%.</u>
 - The number of homes for sale in Michigan decreased by 42% from 2010 to 2019 (compared to 33% nationally).
 - The number of homes for rent decreased by 40% from 2010 to 2019 (compared to 15% nationally).





What Would Help?

- Strongly Support HB 4062 and 4063 Banning Discrimination Based on the Source of Income.
- Land Use Reform Many communities explicitly ban the most affordable types of housing, driving up construction costs and ultimately, rents and sales prices.
- Additional funding
 - Median sale price of a home in Michigan is \$246,800. Even in lower cost metros like Flint, construction costs for single family homes regularly approach or exceed \$300,000.
