**Michigan's Military Establishment**

- Michigan Army National Guard
- Michigan Air National Guard
- Michigan Volunteer Defense Force

The Defense Force is a flexible and permanent military force that is commanded by Michigan's Governor through the Adjutant General--a state defense force cannot be federalized.



"The organized militia of this state taken collectively shall be known as the state military establishment and constitutes the armed forces of this state. The organized militia consists of the **army national guard**, the **air national guard**, and the **defense force**..."

**Michigan Defense Force History**

- 1917: Michigan State Troops and Michigan State Police are created (*Public Act 53 of 1917*).
- 1988: Michigan State Troops renamed Michigan Emergency Volunteers (*Public Act 246 of 1988*).
- 2004: Michigan Emergency Volunteers activated as the Michigan Volunteer Defense Force.
- 2021: Michigan Volunteer Defense Force launches Ready & Able initiative.



"The governor, as commander-in-chief, may activate within the military establishment such number of units to be known as the Michigan volunteer defense force, as the governor considers necessary for adequate emergency assistance to the state." MCL 32.651 Sec. 251

**Ready & Able Initiative**

Under the guidance of LTC Michael Ewing, the Defense Force launched its Ready & Able initiative this year.


The initiative is based upon the Michigan Military Act 150 of 1967 and the current Michigan Department of Military and Veteran Affairs (DMVA) Strategic Plan.

The MI-DMVA plan outlines a 21st century total force strategy that includes all elements of Michigan's Military Establishment, including the Defense Force (MIVDF).

The Ready & Able initiative consists of three elements: train, equip, fund.

### How does the Michigan Volunteer Defense Force benefit Michigan?





- The Defense Force provides a force multiplier for MING in any tasking in which they need support.

**Manpower**

- MIVDF currently has approximately 190 active personnel.
- Approximately 32.5% of personnel served in the U.S. Armed Forces.
- Personnel maximum permitted strength is 15% of the Michigan National Guard.

**Mission Framework**

- Mission types are stated within the Michigan Military Act (PA-150), the Michigan Emergency Management Act (PA-390), and Command Policy Regulation 600-20.
  - Inside Michigan
  - Governments with mutual aid agreements
  - MIVDF to be "Ready & Able" to assume National Guard duties
- Missions are submitted through the State Emergency Operations Center, directed to National Guard, through JFHQ-MI. JFHQ-MI determines whether the assistance of the MIVDF is required. If it is required, a request is made to the Governor to authorize deployment.
  - Emergencies and Disasters
  - Planned Events that may overwhelm local responders

*The "defense force shall perform missions as determined by the department of military and veterans affairs in cooperation with the department of state police and the state emergency preparedness plan."*
