Though Schools to Tools benefits schools and students across the state, the physical offices for MRCC are located in House District 8, State Rep. Helena Scott.

The Schools to Tools Mobile Field Trip is used to expose Middle- and High-School students to the building trades and Apprenticeship opportunities. It travels to schools from SE Michigan, Mid-Michigan, West-Michigan, and the UP, and has reached more than 24,000 students in the year and a half it has been on the road. This grant will enable

the continuation of this impactful program, expanding educational opportunities for students and supporting our trade sector.

This funding will also be used to reach School Teachers and School Counselors to help them receive professional development relevant to CTE programs, jobs in the CTE umbrella, and Apprenticeships. MRCC has developed a State-approved SCECH training, and the Schools to Tools grant allows those trainings and materials to be offered for free.

Finally, the grant will help MRCC conduct career days for students and their parents at training centers across the state and will help MRCC offer summer-camp opportunities for students to get hands-on experience.


