More than 4,000 students will have the option to bike, walk, or roll safely to school in an area currently reliant on personal vehicles and school district bussing.

The Three Mile Trail will navigate through the Mitchell Creek Meadows, a former golf course

transformed into a public conserved space that celebrates environmental stewardship and land

protection. In order to create safe and scenic trails throughout the Mitchell Creek Meadows, the

Three Mile Trail will utilize a mix of asphalt and concrete boardwalk to properly protect the

wetland areas. Contributions from state funding mechanisms will ensure that the correct construction materials can be utilized as we create long-lasting community connections.

Project description and funding proposal purpose:

The Three Mile Trail and Safe Routes to School Projects, two vital yet unfinished efforts, will fill critical gaps in East Bay Township's nonmotorized infrastructure. With enthusiastic support and engagement during project planning stages, community members, landowners, and visitors alike recognize the importance of linking Township neighborhoods, schools, and businesses to a 100+ mile regional trail system and the newly established Mitchell Creek Meadows Nature Preserve. This investment will support the health, well-being, economic vibrancy, and population retention in one of the fastest-growing regions in Michigan.

The Three Mile Trail and Safe Routes to School Projects are phased, multi-year projects. As indicated on the attached project map, each independent segment will significantly improve the mobility and accessibility within East Bay Township. The combined, completed segments will create a transformative multi-modal corridor that this community so deserves.

If given the opportunity and the funding, TART Trails and East Bay Township make major progress within this nonmotorized transportation corridor in the **next two years**.

Description of the funding proposal's public benefit and the need for state funding:

The Three Mile Trail and Safe Routes to School projects will increase the public's nonmotorized access to nearby amenities including **seven schools**, a branch of the Traverse Area District Library, grocery stores, neighborhoods, natural areas, nature preserves, and the beautiful East

Grand Traverse Bay beaches. More than **4,000 students** will have the option to bike, walk, or roll safely to school in an area currently reliant on personal vehicles and school district bussing. The Three Mile Trail will navigate through the Mitchell Creek Meadows, a former golf course transformed into a public conserved space that celebrates environmental stewardship and land protection. In order to create safe and scenic trails throughout the Mitchell Creek Meadows, the Three Mile Trail will utilize a mix of asphalt and concrete boardwalk to properly protect the wetland areas. Contributions from state funding mechanisms will ensure we can utilize the correct construction materials as we create long-lasting community connections.

Please provide a description of any research or evidence backing the project's approach to its stated goal (include any attachments):

In the fall of 2020, all project partners facilitated a community engagement process to garner community feedback and priorities. Survey participants shared they are most interested in the **access** provided by the Three Mile Trail, the opportunity for a **bike trail**, and improved **safety**. 91% of participants intend to use the Three Mile Trail for recreation, 82% for exercise, 54% for transportation, and 16% for outdoor education.

Support and interest were reiterated through the East Bay Township Master Plan finalized in 2023. Through their public survey, 75% of township respondents **supported sidewalks** along collector roads like Three Mile and 72% of respondents were in **support of more bike lanes** throughout the Township and nonmotorized trails along roads such as Hammond Road. A multi-use nonmotorized trail addresses both of these interests.

Have you sought any community input on this project? If so, please provide a brief description:

We have sought community input at multiple points along this project process. In September 2020, project partners hosted an Open House to share the preliminary map with a proposed route. We provided a public survey to gather feedback and created an associated survey report in November 2020. In January 2021, with the help of Parallel Solutions, we conducted stakeholder engagement. In August 2023, we held another well-attended Open House with a survey to gather public input.

Has this project or requesting entity received state funding in the past? If so, please provide a brief description, including previous state funding sources, fiscal years, and amounts: The project has not received state funding in the past. East Bay Township was recently awarded \$400,000 through the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund in December 2024.

How long has funding been sought for this project? How long has state funding been sought for this project?

Funding for this project has been sought since 2019. State funding for this project has been sought since November 2024.

Will this project be receiving other funding? If so, how much and what are the funding sources?

- Three Mile Trail received \$900,000 in Congressionally Directed Spending
- East Bay Township contributed \$1,000,000 toward the Three Mile Trail.
- East Bay Township was awarded a \$400,000 Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund grant for Phase I of the Three Mile Trail.
- Safe Routes to School has committed \$1,500,000 through the Michigan Fitness Foundation for the Township's new pathways along Three Mile and Hammond roads.
- Request for \$3,000,000 from the MDOT Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) for Three Mile Trail
- Requesting second \$400,000 Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund grant for Three Mile Trail

If the funding for this project is granted, will the funds be matched? If so, how much and what are the funding sources?

Funding for this project will be matched. Project partners currently agree on a 60% public funding and a 40% private funding split. This means \$9,000,000 in public funds will be matched with \$6,000,000 in private funding.

Please describe any potential opposition, including organizations or arguments, to the project or funding proposal:

Consistent with other trails that involve boardwalk traversing wetlands, cost is a potential concern. Building responsibly with long-lasting materials costs more at the outset, yet lasts much longer than the cheaper, less sustainable alternative. To address the community's interest in safer, more scenic, and more separated nonmotorized pathways, concrete boardwalks and asphalt sections are the most responsible and sustainable facilities for this trail corridor.


A plan identifying anticipated operational and preventative maintenance tasks, frequency, and cost has been developed for the trail. East Bay Township will be responsible for the operation and maintenance of the completed project. TART Trails will extend its Trail Ambassador program to include the Three Mile Trail. A Trail Maintenance Endowment of \$500,000 will be established to fund annual maintenance costs.

Please share any information on similar projects:

The proposed maintenance endowment is used successfully by TART Trails and municipal partners on two other regional trail projects – the Boardman Lake Trail with an \$800,000 maintenance endowment and the Acme Connector Trail with a \$130,000 maintenance endowment.

On behalf of the members of the <u>Northwest Michigan Community Development Coalition</u>, I am writing to express support for the TART Trails' essential funding request for the Three Mile Trail and Safe Routes to School projects.
