The materials engage students by inviting them to ask questions, examine materials, and interpret history and civics from their unique points of view. This funding will allow the Learning by Hearings team to continue researching and creating high

quality classroom and after-school content, partner with other civic education leaders, and offer free professional development across Michigan.

The Learning by Hearings program provides educational materials designed to be used by teachers in public schools, consistent with State of Michigan standards for social studies, and as such provides a public benefit and is an appropriate use of taxpayer funding. Because a state appropriation for this program is a public benefit, such funding would not violate Article IV, Section 30 of the Michigan Constitution.
