

MDOC Education Overview

- The MDOC is one of the state's largest adult basic education (high school equivalency) providers.
- The MDOC has school staff at every facility and offers basic programs including academic at all sites other than RGC.
- In addition to academic, MDOC schools offer employment readiness, special education, and vital documents support.
- Select MDOC schools also offer vocational programming, post-secondary programming, or both.



Educational Status at Intake

Prisoners who entered prison in 2022 and are currently incarcerated:

Total: 5,305

High School Degree/HSE Verified at Intake: 2,607 (49%)

Completed Since Intake: 661 (12.4%)

Active in School: 889 (16.7%)

School Waitlist: 1,069 (20.1%)



Academic Programming

The MDOC's schools utilize certified teachers who work with students to complete a high school equivalency (HSE) test.

The MDOC currently utilizes two HSE's: GED and HiSet.

There are 2,900 students currently active in academic programming within the MDOC (5,700 are on the waitlist).

Completion of a HSE is a requirement for parole for many prisoners, with certain statutory exemptions.



Career and Technical Education

The MDOC offers Career and Technical Education programs in a variety of disciplines.

Programs include: Welding, Carpentry, Food Tech/Hospitality, Cement and Masonry, CDL, Forklift, Optical, and Horticulture.

Students are selected for programs based on interest and aptitude as they approach their first parole consideration.



MDOC Vocational Villages

- The MDOC operates 3 Vocational Villages, which are the most immersive skilled trades programs.
- Programs include: CNC Machining, Robotics, Auto Tech, Diesel Mechanic, Carpentry, Cement and Masonry, Computer Coding, CDL, 3D Printing, Cosmetology, and Welding.
- Expansion of the Parnall Vocational Village will occur in 2023/2024.



MDOC Post-Secondary Programs

- The MDOC currently has partnerships with 6 post-secondary schools that offer classes at 11 facilities.
- These programs are primarily supported via a federal pilot utilizing Pell Grants.
- Pell Grants will once again be available for most prisoners in 2023.
- The MDOC is speaking with 6+ additional schools about adding programs over the next few years.




Employment Readiness Program

- Nearly all prisoners will complete this soft skills/practical skills program prior to release.
- Areas of focus include: Digital Literacy, Financial Literacy, Resume' Writing, Mock Interviews, and Soft Skills.
- There were over 5,000 program completions last fiscal year.



MDOC Education Technology

- The Department is currently replacing its antiquated education network with a secure version of Google Classroom.
- Starting in 2023, every classroom will include student technology to expand learning opportunities.
- With the proposed secure WIFI project, education could move beyond the school buildings to every area of the prisons.



Vital Documents

- Birth Certificates
 - 2020: 5,475
 - 2021: 18,288
 - 2022: 8,382
- State ID/DL
 - 2020: 715
 - 2021: 4,831
 - 2022: 5,939
- Since October '21, over 96% of individuals releasing to Michigan have had a State ID or Driver's License.



Employment Efforts

• The MDOC's employment efforts include Education, FOA, the Employment and Opportunities Unit (EOU), and OS Administrative Agencies.

 EOU hosts job fairs, works with employers to find candidates, and promotes the goal of employment.
