RE: FY 2013-14 University Tuition Restraint Compliance

The FY 2013-14 Higher Education budget, as contained in Article III of Public Act 60 of 2013, provided for performance based funding increases to public universities totaling \$21.9 million (1.8%). Receipt of those funding increases by the universities is contingent on compliance with four requirements. Three of the requirements are retained from the FY 2012-13 budget in Sec. 265a:

- Participation in reverse transfer agreements with at least three community colleges (or a good faith effort to enter into such agreements).
- A dual enrollment credit policy that does not consider whether the credits were utilized toward high school graduation requirements in determining acceptance for college credit.
- Participation in the Michigan Transfer Network (an online system that provides transparency regarding course transfer equivalencies among Michigan colleges and universities).

Additionally, a university must comply with tuition restraint requirements specified in Sec. 265. (In FY 2012-13, a separate funding incentive had been provided based on tuition restraint, rather than including it as a requirement to receive any performance funding.) The basic requirement, subject to certain definitions contained in the section, is as follows:

Payments under section 265a for performance funding shall only be made to a public university that certifies to the state budget director by August 31, 2013 that its board did not adopt an increase in tuition and fee rates for resident undergraduate students after September 1, 2012 for the 2012-2013 academic year and that its board will not adopt an increase in tuition and fee rates for resident undergraduate students for the 2013-2014 academic year that is greater than 3.75%.

Universities were required to submit certification of their compliance with the performance funding requirements by August 31. In correspondence dated September 10, the State Budget Director indicates he has determined that all universities are in compliance with the requirements except that Wayne State University has adopted a resident undergraduate tuition and fee increase above the 3.75% threshold.

Attachment 1 shows university resident undergraduate tuition and fee increases for FY 2013-14.¹ Removing Wayne State's increase of 8.90%, increases at the other 14 universities range from 1.14% to 3.75%. The average increase across all 15 universities is 3.49%.

University resident undergraduate tuition and fee rates for FY 2013-14 range from \$8,423 to \$14,861, with an unweighted average rate of \$11,142.

¹ To conform with budget act language and HEIDI reporting requirements, minor technical adjustments have been made to the tuition and fee information in the universities' official submissions.

Under Sec. 265a(2), Wayne State's initial performance funding increase of \$534,700 will be reallocated to the other 14 universities in proportion to their respective performance funding amounts. Attachment 2 displays those calculations. Because Wayne State received the smallest percentage increase in funding under the performance funding model (0.29%), the impact of the reallocation on other universities' funding increases is relatively small. The reallocated funding amounts for individual universities range from \$4,500 to \$124,000.

<u>General Note:</u> Per HEIDI reporting requirements, and consistent with Sec. 265 of budget act, rates are reported based on four class levels. Rates are based on 30 credit hours (15 in Fall, 15 in Winter/Spring) and exclude fees not paid by a majority of students in a given class (most course fees), as well as refundable fees.

*University-Specific Notes

Eastern: \$212 out of \$300 fee for incoming freshman excluded from rate in both years, as that amount effectively replaced previous orientation fee.

Ferris: Includes junior/senior differential increase of \$5/credit hour for Spring semester.

Michigan State: Differential increase: 1.9% for freshman/sophomore rates; 3.6% for junior/senior rates.

Michigan Tech: Sophomore/junior/senior rates include additional surcharge applying to engineering and computer science students.

UM-Ann Arbor: Rates are for College of Literature, Science, and Arts.UM-Dearborn: Rates are for College of Arts, Sciences, and Letters.
