RE: Clean Michigan Initiative

The following information provides background and financial information concerning the Clean Michigan Initiative which is partly administered by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ).

Clean Michigan Initiative (CMI)

In 1998, Michigan voters approved a \$675.0 million general obligation bond, the Clean Michigan Initiative (CMI), to fund environmental, health, and natural resources protection programs. The Michigan Constitution stipulates that a general obligation bond may be issued if approved by two- thirds of the Legislature and a majority of voters. Of the \$675.0 million approved for the CMI, \$570.0 million is earmarked for environmental protection and clean-up programs overseen by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ). \$100.0 million of the funding is dedicated for Natural Resources Protection programs overseen by the Department of Natural Resources (DNR). The remaining \$5.0 million is earmarked for health protection programs under the Department of Health & Human Services (DHHS).

By law, CMI bond proceeds are to be used as follows (MCL 324.19607):

Health Protection Programs (DHHS):

Abatement of lead hazards 5.0 million

Natural Resources Protection Programs (DNR):

State park infrastructure improvements 50.0 million Local recreation projects 50.0 million

The DHHS and DNR portions have been exhausted. There are six CMI programs administered by the DEQ through its various divisions. Bond proceeds are required to be used for programs that would clean up and redevelop contaminated sites, protect and improve water quality, prevent pollution, abate lead contamination, reclaim and revitalize community waterfronts, enhance recreational opportunities, and clean up contaminated sediments in lakes, rivers, and streams. Table A illustrates these programs and their respective appropriations through FY 2017-18.
