## **RE:** House Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services hearing on Opioid Settlements

Dear Chair VanWoerkom and Members of the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services:

The Michigan Association of Counties (MAC) understands that the Subcommittee on Health and Human Services will hear presentations on opioid settlements. MAC has worked diligently providing individualized technical assistance and support to counties as they plan for, and spend, their opioid settlement funds. MAC has created a toolkit for local spending, resource center, resource library, local government learning community, and numerous other resources for use by local governments. MAC continues to earn national recognition for its leadership in helping county governments effectively utilize opioid settlement funds.

Since 2023, MAC has issued an annual voluntary survey to better understand where settlement funds are being utilized. This data has been utilized to update the MAC Opioid Settlement Dashboard and release a regular report. The 2024 report can be viewed <a href="here">here</a>. The data and report from the 2025 survey will be available this summer.


The majority of counties have followed MAC's guidance on planning for spending found in the Michigan Opioid Settlement Funds Toolkit: A Guide for Local Spending. The toolkit provides direction on process and linkage to existing resources provided by local and national entities and to assist with creation of targeted efforts. The document outlines a process of stakeholder engagement, data gathering, determination of a process moving forward, and monitoring and accountability. With this guidance, along with supplemental guidance and tools from MAC, most counties have created opioid settlement steering committees and have utilized, or are engaged in, a competitive request for proposal process to ensure access to funds. Counties are committed to funding solutions that meet local needs and transparent processes.


For calendar year 2023, approximately half of counties were still in planning phases and had not yet spent funds. For counties who responded to the survey question on where funds had been spent (55 counties), 29% spent on treatment and support for individuals engaged in the criminal-legal system, 22% on prevention programming, and 22% on expanding access to naloxone. Funding recovery support services and access to medication to treat opioid use disorder (MOUD) were the next highest funded with 15% of counties supporting these efforts.


For calendar year 2024, around 60% of counties had funded initiatives. Responding counties (36 counties) funded the strategies of expanding warm hand-off programs and recovery support services (34%), expanding access to naloxone or other FDA-approved drugs to review opioid overdoses

(29%), expanding prevention programs (29%), and providing treatment and support for individuals engaged with the criminal-legal system (29%).


